The benefits of being bilingual

Being bilingual means having the ability to live your everyday life using two languages. There are many advantages to this and in Wales one of the most common routes to bilingualism is being educated through the medium of Welsh.



The aim of this booklet is to explain the advantages of being bilingual, answer a few common questions and tell parents where they can find more information about Welsh medium education in the Vale of Glamorgan.

An Educational Edge ...

- Bilingual children tend to achieve higher within the curriculum and to perform better in exams.
 - Learning a second language at a young age helps children develop an ear for languages and gives them a head start at learning a third or fourth language as they get older.

- Children who speak two languages tend to become better at analysing data, multi-tasking, tend to do better in IQ tests and have higher cognitive skills.
- Because they learn in a way that teaches more than one word for an object or concept people who speak two languages become more flexible, sensitive and creative.

Advantages in later life...

- Speaking two languages offers more employment opportunities. In Wales speaking Welsh is a
 workplace skill, especially within the public and service sectors, and due to recent changes to the
 law more and more employers will need a bilingual workforce.
- Bilingual people earn on average 11% more.
- People who speak two or more languages tend to do better working under pressure.
- Speaking more than one language opens up a wider range of social activities and expands horizons.
- Learning through another language helps children develop a greater sensitivity to other cultures and backgrounds.
- Speaking more than one language helps to reduce the risk of dementia in later life.

Welsh Heritage & Culture ...

The Welsh language is a key part of our Welsh heritage. Speaking Welsh gives people a closer relationship with the history, heritage and traditions of Wales. It also lets people learn the Welsh sayings, music, poetry and literature which are celebrated and respected worldwide.

These cultural benefits make for a strong personal identity which increases a young person's sense of belonging and self-worth.

Did you know?

At least half of the world's population is bilingual or multilingual ie they speak 2 or more languages.

and did you know...

Welsh is one of the oldest living languages in Europe.

Put simply, a bilingual education enhances opportunities – it doesn't limit them.

I see the benefits but I don't speak Welsh and I'm concerned

that ... "

... I won't know what's going on in a Welsh speaking environment.



The vast majority of parents who send their children to Welsh medium schools in the Vale don't speak Welsh themselves. This is why Welsh medium schools in the Vale of Glamorgan always communicate with parents in both Welsh and English.

The classroom environment is Welsh (apart from English lessons of course!) but whenever parents, carers, relatives and friends visit the school, bilingualism is the norm. This means that teachers and pupils will speak Welsh or English depending on who is in the conversation.

... I won't be able to help my child with homework.

This is a very common concern that teachers in Welsh medium schools are fully aware of and always take into account when setting homework. In almost all cases homework will have an English explanation provided with it so all parents can help their children with the work.

There is also a large amount of support available on childfriendly websites – homework after all is set for children and not parents! But, if in doubt, simply ask.

... I don't want their English language skills to suffer

Bilingual people are more sensitive when communicating and so are more aware of the needs of listeners, especially when switching from one language to another. This often makes them better communicators in both languages.



What do parents say?

I was initially concerned that I would be the only parent that didn't speak Welsh and that my son's pace of learning would be behind his English speaking peers. This has not been the case and at the age of 6 he reads well in both languages.
